How Do You View God's Word

In Psalm 1.1-2 the Psalmist writes the man who is blessed is the one who delights "in the law of the Lord" and meditates on it day and night. On another occasion says "I find my delight in your commandments, which I love (Psalm 119.47). God's commands brought him joy and happiness and were constantly in the forefront of his mind. What is it about God's word that causes these emotions?

Peter writes "His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness" (2 Peter 1.3). The word of God brings a reader joy because God has given us everything pertaining to our spiritual needs. The "life" refers to how to be saved from our sins. Mankind is a sinful creature, deserving of spiritual death because of our actions. But God being rich in mercy and grace because of His love for mankind provided a way for him to have salvation, thus being made alive again through Christ (Ephesians 2.1-7). Jesus said, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10.10). "Godliness" refers to how to remain saved. Though God loves mankind, he demands obedience. We must do our part to maintain our salvation. 2 Peter 1.8-11 tells us we must grow in certain characteristics to be fruitful servants of God to ensure our salvation.

Not only does the Bible speak to the spiritual needs of man, but also to the physical. God knows what is best for His creation and has revealed to us what we need to know, that we might follow His commands. Deuteronomy 29.29 says, "The secret things belong to the LORD our God, but the things that are revealed belong to us and to our children forever, that we may do all the words of this law." …

There are many societal issues that can be traced back to failing to live as God's word has commanded. Psalms 119.92 says, "If your law had not been my delight, I would have perished in my affliction." A life lived in devotion to God produces the best physical life and spiritual life. With the many blessings that come from God's word it's no wonder why it brings the reader joy. So why do so many still find no delight in God's commands?

Some approach the word from a wrong perspective. They view the Bible as a book that tells them all the things they can't do, instead of how the word can make their lives better and complete. The Bible does list many things that a person needs to abstain from because God knows they are not good for mankind to engage in. One example being the lusts of the flesh listed in Galatians 5.19-21. We were not made for those things; they are of no benefit to us. We were made to be God's workmanship to live a life of righteous and holy conduct (1 Peter 1.16). Mankind may think they know what is best, but God does know. The wisdom of man is foolishness compared to the wisdom of God.

Other are afraid to change. God's word has never "fit-in" with the popular culture of the day. What is popular and celebrated today the Bible condemns. Those who followed God's word were counterculture in Jesus' day and will still be in the 21st century. Jesus calls on His follower to be different, to live by higher and nobler way (Matthew 5-7). Many know following the Bible will cause them to have to make changes, but they are comfortable going with the flow, even if that is leading them down the wrong path. It is more important in their eyes to be liked by men instead of being approved by God. Which is a sad situation. It is not going to be the most popular, well-liked or the wealthiest who inherit the kingdom of heaven, but those who humble themselves and submit to the will of God. "For am I now seeking the approval of man, or of God? Or am I trying to please man? If I were still trying to please man, I would not be a servant of Christ (Galatians 1.10).

A Righteous Man and A Murky Spring

Proverbs 25:26, "A righteous man who falters before the wicked is like a murky spring and a polluted well" (NKJ). "A good person who gives into a bad person is a muddied spring, a polluted well" (The Message).

Earlier in Proverbs, the mouth of the righteous was described as a "well of life" (Prov. 10:11). The counsel given is like drinking from fresh spring water. There is comfort and wisdom. But if a righteous man gives in to the wicked, either through fear or seeking favor, he can no longer give counsel out of a pure heart. He becomes like a fountain fouled by the feet of cattle drinking at it.

The proverb is a generalization, it doesn't contemplate one's return. Generally speaking, when one who is striving to be righteous falls and does not return, he is like a murky spring, polluted. No matter how long one sought to be righteous, when one falls and continues that path, he's polluted. Now corrupt, unserviceable. Now miserable to oneself and others.

Haven't we all seen a person like this? For example, Demas who loved the present world, became like a murky spring. All the good he did with Paul was now ruined by his love for the world. Because of his influence, he did great damage to the cause of Jesus Christ.

But can the usefulness of a righteous man be restored so that he is like a fresh spring? Yes, the righteous man can repent and return to God and his influence can be restored. He can overcome his failings. He can be useful and serve others.

So, turn the Proverb around. A righteous man, though he falls, may turn. When he does, he is like a spring — now useful to all.
